
EXPLANATION OF THE CHARACTER ENTRIES


Hiragana/Katakana



1. The kana character in brush form, with numbers showing stroke order positioned at the beginning of each stroke.

- 2. Squares with the kana character in pen form, printed in light gray, and serving as a practice template to trace over.
- 3. Empty squares in which to write first the kana character and then the example words.
- 4. The kana character in printed form, with pronunciation in roman letters.
- 5. Kanji from which the kana character is derived, with the sequential number of that kanji.
- 6. Up to four common words, with romanization and meanings. These words contain only kana that have already been introduced.

Kanji



- The kanji in brush form, with numbers showing stroke order positioned at the beginning of each stroke.
- 2. Three squares with the kanji in pen form, printed in light gray and serving as a practice template to trace over.
- 3. Empty squares in which to write the entry kanji and compounds.
- 4. Number of the kanji in these manuals.
- 5. a. Radical with its number-and-letter "descriptor", under which the kanji is listed in the Japanese Character Dictionary 3.
 - b. Up to three graphemes (basic elements) with their number-and-letter "descriptor", under which the kanji can be retrieved in *SUNRISE*

Script (see footnote 2).

A numeral from 2 to 4 added to the descriptor indicates how many times that radical or grapheme is contained in the kanji. If the radical is not a grapheme, it is put in parentheses.

- 6. On readings, in capital italics; kun readings, in lowercase italics; readings that are infrequent or used only in special cases, in brackets; okurigana (part of a word that is written in kana), in parentheses; English meanings. All officially recognized readings of the kanji are listed.
- 7. Compounds, with romanization, meanings, and cross-reference numbers to the main entries for other kanji in the compound.
